We have to prepare and provide similar information multiple times and it is a repetitive effort and wastage of institute effort time. Many departments like Botany and Geography are restructuring their student database. • A similar database consisting of all information related to teacher activity in academic or field of research is equally vital. The CMIS software also caters to this. The Career Advancement Scheme for the teachers is also managed by this software. This system is also being reorganized.
